# **A Visible Sign That We Care**

A columbarium is a place for the respectful storage of burial urns (which word comes from the Latin columba (dove) and originally referred to pigeons. The Romans typically built their columbaria partially or completely underground. If you have ever been to Rome, you have probably seen them. I had the chance to visit some amazing columbaria when I was in Israel. Today, columbaria are often free standing units,

More and more churches are constructing columbaria on their properties as a way to honor the deceased in their communities. Ridge Church's columbarium will be attached to the south exterior wall of the Sanctuary. It will consist of 56 niches that can each hold two urns. The area surrounding the columbarium will be landscaped to provide a serene and private environment where people may go to pay their respects.

Why are we doing this?

or the last several years, a group of people has explored the idea of erecting a columbarium on Ridge Church property. This group presented a plan to the Operations Team late last year—the result of much research and hard work. With a policy in place, the Operations Team is now getting everything ready to break ground on the columbarium this spring.

# Menus for WWE in February



# LENT BEGINS ON FEBRUARY 18TH SERVICE AT 7 P.M.

We will hold a special Ash Wednesday service to help us begin our Lenten journey.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent, a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. It emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God, and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

During our service, the pastors will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshippers. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins. The ashes we use come from the palm branches used at a Palm Sunday service—a reminder of the circle of life that we are all part of.

# Coming soon to Ridge Church: STEPHEN MINISTRIES

Several weeks ago our congregation decided to enroll in the Stephen Series system of lay caring ministry, developed by Stephen Ministries, a not-for-profit religious and educational organization based in St. Louis, Missouri. We will be developing a lasting program of caring ministry through the Stephen Series. This model of ministry is already working in thousands of congregations throughout North America and is equipping laypeople to minister to others who are in need.

From February 1st through February 7th, Lisa Percak and Kathy O'Brien will be attending a one-week Stephen Series Leader's Training Course in Anaheim, California. At this training course, they will receive the instruction and materials necessary to implement and sustain this program of lay caring ministry here at Ridge Church.

Following the Leader's Training Course, laypeople from Ridge Church will be invited to undertake 50 hours of training in Christian caring skills under the guidance of Pastor Sheri, who is a trained Stephen Minister, Lisa and Kathy. This training will prepare lay people to care for others, covering such areas as how to listen effectively, how to deal with

feelings, how to use traditional Christian resources in caring, how to maintain confidentiality, and how to deal with people experiencing crises. A Christ-centered approach to caring and the need to care for the whole person will be stressed throughout the training.

Upon completion of the Stephen Series training, these lay caregivers will be commissioned as "Stephen Ministers," and will become an important part of the caring ministry here at Ridge Church. These Stephen Ministers will provide confidential, one-to-one Christian care for people experiencing challenges in their lives—such as hospitalization, loss of a loved one, loneliness, divorce, unemployment, birth of a child, and many other life events for which a person could benefit from effective caring ministry.

This will be an exciting time for Ridge Church. The Stephen Series both multiplies the amount of caring ministry that goes on in our congregation and deepens the level of participation by laypeople in the healing ministry of Jesus Christ.

If you have questions about this new form of ministry our congregation is undertaking, please feel free to ask Kathy or Pastor Sheri. In the meantime, please keep Lisa, Kathy and our congregation in your thoughts and prayers as we prepare for this major step



# Operations Team (Finance & Trustees) from the January 13th meeting:

 There was a question about a line in the finance report titled "Emerging Ministries," with an expense of \$2,959. It was explained that the expense is related to the costs associated with forming a new Stephen Ministry (see page 4).

sale of the parsonage

- New energy-efficient LED fixtures were installed in the parking lot, which is now brightly illuminated at night. Dave Miller reported that according to meter readings taken before and after the LEDs were installed, the energy usage was reduced by one half.
- A 56-niche columbarium will be installed at Ridge Church

in 2015. The Operations Team approved offering niches at a pre-sale price of \$1,600 (each niche holds two cremain urns) during Lent. This will be advertised in various ways during February, with a display and applications available starting Sunday, February 22nd. Interested parties may request a packet that includes a Columbarium Policy and Application Forms. Members of the Columbarium Committee, who will oversee the construction, landscaping, and maintenance, are Jeanine Svoboda, Wayne Cable, Rick Schumacher, Adam Tenbarge and the Senior Pastor.

- A Pledge Campaign update: as of January 13th, \$308,898 was pledge to the General Fund, and \$29,355 to the Building Fund. By comparison, in 2014 \$365,228 was pledged to the General Fund, and \$14,840 to the Building Fund.
- A first draft of the 2015 budget was reviewed. Due to concerns about the low pledge amount, the budget was not approved, and will be reviewed again in February.

**Missions Team,** from the January 20th meeting:

A total of \$4,332 was collected during Advent:
 \$715 for Missions (undesignated); \$50 for Children of Abraham; \$1,255 for Pastor's Discretionary;
 \$290 for Ebola Response;
 \$370 for National Mission

- Trip; and \$1,652 for Soup Kitchen.
- The team discussed the ebola crisis, which is finally subsiding in Africa. While the disease is abating, the need for food, sanitation. and aid is still dire. So, the team chose to make a \$2,000 donation to Kokeh Kotee, who is responding to dire needs in the Monrovia, Liberia area, and a \$2.000 donation to the Hunger in West Africa program through Operation Classroom in Sierra Leone.
- Sue Cook provided an update on the Haiti trip (see page 7).
- The Lenten Offering envelopes will have the same mission projects as Advent, minus the National Mission trip (which has not been scheduled).
- The team will sponsor a "Service Fair" on Sunday, September 13th to highlight all active ministry and service groups of Ridge Church. Invitations and information will be sent to representatives of these groups soon.
  - Russ Snyder conducted the holiday light recycling program during the holidays, and made several trips to a recycling firm in Hammond. The total raised from the lights and extension cords was about \$14. The Missions Team thanks all who brought their old string of holiday lights and/or extension cords for recycling. However, the team is

On Friday, February 20th, Ridge Youth will begin a 30hour fast to better understand the experience of those less


fortunate around the world who do not have enough to eat.

Just because some of our youth have moved on to college doesn't mean we have forgotten about the



adult lives, raise our children in our church—why would we want to be remembered in a cemetery? Why would we not want to be remembered among the living at our church that means so much to us? Why would we not want to still be a part of the spirit of our church? Our family, which we leave behind, will still be at the church. Therefore, having a columbarium at the church will make it easier for them to "visit" and to keep the memory of us alive.

Having a columbarium is a visible sign that the church cares for their members from birth and baptism to death and eternal life. A columbarium is a way for the church to offer a practical and comfortable way for its members to make predeath plans, relieving the surviving family of the difficult decisions at the time their loved one passes. There are so many things that have to be done when an individual dies that it's



important to make pre-death plans now, and not put that burden onto your family or friends.

#### It just makes sense!

Ridge Church received a generous "seed" gift to get this project off the ground. We only need a few families to buy a niche in the columbarium to make it a reality. Starting on Sunday, February 22nd, we will begin our "pre-sale" of niches. We will be running a discounted price through Easter. During Lent, our WWE program will focus on issues of death and dying, and we will be available to answer any questions you might have about the columbarium.

The UMW also handles the Soup Kitchen finances. The Soup Kitchen began 2014 with a balance of \$1,941, and received \$2,450 in donations. A total of \$4,103 was spent to feed one meal each week to the homeless at City Rescue Mission in Hammond.

Another way to think of this: the Soup Kitchen program faithfully feeds between 35 and 50 people each week, spending on average just \$79.

February... What's one of the first things that comes to mind during the month of February? LOVE! And why shouldn't it? Valentine's Day is celebrated this month, conjuring images of cupids and red hearts, roses and chocolates.

In my mind, it also brings to the forefront thoughts about God's love. Both the Old and the New Testaments say a lot about love... God's love for us, our love for God. And our love for each other. In the Synoptic Gospels—Matthew, Mark, and Luke—Jesus named love for God and love for each other as the two greatest commandments, quoting from Leviticus and Deuteronomy. The topic of love is woven throughout the Gospel of John.

We read in 1 John 4:7-12 that "... God is love...." Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 13 about love, dedicating this short chapter to the topic. Verses 13:4-7: "Love is..." Paul isn't prescribing how we're supposed to act; instead he's describing how we naturally behave when we have love. I encourage you to read these passages.

It's easy to buy our loved one flowers or chocolates, or give another token of affection to show our love... but that doesn't work with God. We can't "buy" something to show God our love. We are incredibly blessed because each of us is already loved and cherished by God. So, how can we show God our love? Simple: gracing each other with genuine love.
