We live in a world that expects instant results. You work on your computer and get frustrated if what you're looking for doesn't come up immediately. You get a medical test and you expect the results now. You order something on line and are willing to pay exorbitant prices so it can be there tomorrow instead of the day after tomorrow.

The same thing happens with Christmas. We talk about "the Christmas rush". We run around getting everything ready for the one day. It's there before you know it. Then the day happens and there's nothing left but crumpled wrapping paper.

Observing Advent allows you to do something different. Advent is a waiting season, a pregnant season. It is a pause as we wait for something wonderful that's on the way, something whose timing is out of our hands but in God's hands. This waiting time isn't just about the outward preparations we make for Christmas. It's about God preparing us from the inside out as we await the birth of God's son and the coming of God's kingdom. This preparation can't be rushed.

So this Advent, our theme will be "Waiting..." In worship, we will wait for Christ's coming as we light the Advent candle and offer our prayers. You are invited to wait and worship and pray with this year's Advent devotional. But don't just wait in your formal spiritual life. I encourage you to practice waiting as a spiritual discipline this Advent. If you're in line in a store, don't just glare and shift your weight from one foot to the other, wondering how long this is going to take. Take a deep breath, think of this as a God-given moment, smile and maybe even strike up a conversation. If you're stuck in traffic, put relaxing music on the radio and use the pause to pray. If there's too much to do, figure out something to not-do, and wait, wait, wait for the coming of the Lord.

For Christ is coming, bringing hope and peace and joy and love. Christ is coming, not according to our timing, but in God's time. Christ is coming to make all things, including you, new. Isn't that worth waiting for?





The editor of the devotional says" It is doubtful that there is a more appropriate author than Henri Nouwen to accompany us during Advent....Few people can reach down and touch our deepest doubts, anxieties and joys as Henri Nouwen seems to do so effortlessly. It is because he shares these same emotional highs and lows that he is able to uncover the intimate, spiritual dimension within them that can help enliven our faith life....Let Nouwen's words seep into your heart and make your Advent a rich and rewarding experience, bringing you closer to God and to God's people." The afternoon will end as we pack holiday food baskets together to be delivered to families in need for the Christmas season.


This day of worship, food and fellowship has become a highlight of the season for our churches. Let's celebrate together

Session

Chambers November Session Notes

The Session of Chambers Church met on Wednesday, November 5. The following items were discussed:

- The Stewardship Campaign has begun, along with preliminary work on the 2015 budget.
- The Rutledge Borough Zoning Committee heard Chambers' proposal to sell the manse. All requests were granted, with the understanding that some yardage from the parking lot (6 ½ or 7 ½ feet) will need to be included in the manse property to standardize the size of the lot. Also, at settlement some funds might need to be allotted which would be used to install a driveway on the manse property. The proposal will now be presented to Borough Council.
- Nineteen people wrapped 138 gifts during the wrapping party on November 1. Those gifts will go to the children at the Village. An additional 25 gifts will be donated to Chester Eastside.
- The Mission and Outreach Team will sponsor a yard sale on November 22, from 8AM noon, for the purpose of selling the furniture that remains in the garage. Proceeds will be split between Chambers and Chester Eastside.
- Planning has begun for the Advent Season. The joint service and Advent luncheon will be held on December 14 at Chambers.
- The Shared Ministry Council is finalizing job descriptions for the Pastor, Music Director, and Church Administrator. Job performance reviews for staff members will be conducted in January.
- Volunteers are being sought to contribute snacks and to help with hospitality at the Community Thanksgiving Service on November 26 at Princeton.
- Jim Wurster and Tom Reinke, directors of the New Avenue Foundation, introduced themselves to the Session. Their foundation is interested in using church space for programs for young adults with disabilities. They have proposed using the multi-purpose room one or two nights a week for a coffeehouse, which would provide a place for these young adults to socialize. They may also be interested in leasing office space in the future. It is hoped that, when the program is up and running, members of the church might also become involved.

Princeton November Session Notes

- Clerk's Report Minutes of October 7th stated meeting approved as presented.
- **Treasurer's Report** It was noted that the October financials showed that year to date regular giving is behind budget and rental income is above budget.
- Nurture Faith Team Key dates were reviewed for the Advent and Christmas season.
- **Building Community Team** Session did not approve recommendation from the team to become a Congregational Partner with Heeding God's Call. 25% of Peacemaking offering will be sent to support the mission of Heeding God's Call. Plans will be made to display the "Memorial to the Lost" in 2015.
- **Report of the Pastor** As requested, the Session will meet with Helen Williams before worship on November 23rd to accept her into membership of our church.
- Other Business Discussion took place regarding the need for a task force to be in place at
 Princeton to organize special events such as the Covenant luncheon, Christmas luncheon,
 Lenten suppers, picnic, and the upcoming reception after the Thanksgiving Eve community
 service. With unanimous approval, the Princeton Party People was formed and Diane
 Denk was named as the convener. Several names were suggested to be part of the task
 force.


Session unanimously approved to give a \$15.00 voucher per space to dealers who reserved spaces for October flea market to be used as credit for our next flea market and to raise the fee to \$30.00 per space. June 6th was set as tentative date for spring flea market.

Elder Carolyn Jeffrey was elected to serve as commissioner to November 18th Presbytery meeting at Carmel Presbyterian Church.

We will begin collecting on Sunday , November 9th, which is Feeding Others Sunday. The following items are needed to make up each basket, the essentials for a holiday dinner.

Peanut butter Grape jelly Canned vegetables and gravy

The following is a list of the canned and non-perishable

items that can also be included:


