I know we will all miss the additional gift his family has been to us. John's children, his father, his wife and his sister have all joined us for some wonderful special music over the years. We wish John well, and ask God's blessing on him and on his family in the future.

Chambers will also be saying goodbye to Patrick Clark, who has worked as a custodian there for the last ten years. Those who knew Patrick give thanks for his willing hands, his gentle spirit and his commitment to his work and to his Lord. I'll miss listening to him sing as he went about his work. Patrick will not lack for things to do. He will continue his work at Giant, where he'll pick up more hours, and his work with his father, as well as participating in his many activities. Patrick has said he'd be willing to help out when he's needed, so we may still get to see him sometimes. We will be recognizing Patrick for his service during worship on Sunday, January 11 at Chambers with a coffee hour to follow. Alonzo Baird Jr. will continue to work as Chambers sexton.

As we move ahead, we are putting the pieces in place to begin the search for a new director of music. For the next month or so at least, we will have guest musicians, with members of the choir providing occasional special music. Having been through searches like this in the past, it is always interesting to see what particular gifts the next music director will bring. Each person who has filled the position has left their own unique mark on the congregation. One of the things we have learned is that often the best candidates come through word of mouth, so if you know anyone who might be good, please mention the position to them.

What beginnings will the new year bring? We don't yet know the whole story, although some interesting things are happening at Chambers as we engage in conversations with the New Avenues Foundation about a coffeehouse and other programming for young adults with mental disabilities. We walk ahead in faith, trusting in God, seeking day by day to see the next step he has in store for us. We walk in gratitude, thanking God for what God has already done among us. We walk in hope, knowing that our hope will not be disappointed, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

ANNUAL MEETING AND REPORTS NOTICE

The annual meeting of the congregation and corporation of Princeton Presbyterian Church will be held on Sunday, February 1 immediately following worship. The meeting will be held in Boggs Hall. In addition to receiving the reports of the teams of the church and reviewing the finances of the past year, there will be a time for an important discussion about the future of our congregation. Please make every effort to be there. The deadline for reports from all teams is January 12th. Annual Reports will be available on Sunday, January 25.

The annual meeting of the corporation of Chambers Memorial Presbyterian Church will be held on Sunday, February 1 immediately following worship in the sanctuary. The primary purpose of this meeting is to review the finances of the last year as well as the 2015 budget. Financial reports will be available for review on Sunday, January 25.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

At both Chambers and Princeton, there is much to give thanks for as our stewardship campaigns were completed this year. Through your pledges, many members have shown the depth of their commitment both to their Lord and to the church. We are grateful for your generosity, and hope that it will sustain our congregations in the year ahead.

However, as both churches developed their budgets, it became clear that there would be significant shortfalls in 2015. These shortfalls are due, in large part, to the loss of members who were generous givers. Both sessions are aware of this and have taken some steps to reduce the shortfall. In the case of Chambers, one of these steps was letting Patrick go. At the same time, Chambers is working to increase rental income as we develop a ministry partnership with the New Avenues Foundation. In the case of Princeton, we have been able to reallocate some funds into the 2015 budget year. However, these will be one time adjustments. Prayers are needed as we move ahead. We will be having some serious conversations in this year about what the future may hold for our churches. If you are able, we encourage you to consider increasing your giving so we can continue the meaningful ministries of our congregations. We move ahead in faith, trusting in God. We ask for your continued support and prayer.

CHAMBERS DECEMBER SESSION

The Session of Chambers Church met on December 3. The following items were discussed at that meeting:

- The Financial Management Commission of the Presbytery has given permission for the manse to be listed for sale once the borough and county have given their approval.
- The Apportionment assessment will be \$25.27 per member for 2015. This money supports the work of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, Synod of the Trinity, and General Assembly.
- The 2015 budget was accepted as presented.
- The Shared Ministry Council has recommended that no staff raises be granted for the coming year, due to lack of resources.
- It was regretfully decided to terminate Patrick's employment with Chambers as of December 31. His dedication to the church as a part-time sexton will be recognized one Sunday in January.
- The manse rent will be raised to \$1615 per month as of January 1.
- \$200 from Chambers' Thanksgiving Fund was donated to First Presbyterian Church of Glenolden to help fund their community Thanksgiving dinner.
- Pastor McShane officiated at the wedding of Samantha Gaynor and Nicholas Vietro on November 8. She also conducted the memorial service for long-time member Virginia Hornberger on November 17.
- The Pastor has been granted study leave from January 19-25, and vacation from January 26-30.
- The New Avenue Foundation, which would like to use space in our building to create a coffee house for young adults with disabilities, was given permission to begin in January. They will be granted use of the multi-purpose room at a reduced rate for three months. In April, the program will be evaluated, and if it is running successfully, the rent will be raised to our usual rates.

PRINCETON DECEMBER SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Administrative – Session approved the transfer of \$5,000 to the Current funds from the Capital Funds made on November 23rd. Session also approved the 2015 proposed budget showing budgeted receipts of \$151,327 and total expenditures of \$161,742 with addition of \$350 for Sunday School expenses under Nurture Faith. The pastor's salary will be presented separately at the annual congregational meeting for approval. Approval was given for use of Boggs Hall by a Girl Scout Cadet troop and a Junior troop on Thursday nights.

Building Community Team – Written report was presented. Session noted that discussion took place on how we can connect with those who use our building such as Li'l Tykes and the AA groups.

Report of the Pastor – Session approved request for study leave January 19-25 and vacation January 27-30.

Connecting with the Larger Church – Carolyn Jeffrey, who was commissioner to the November 18th Presbytery meeting presented a report. With approval being given, merger of camping ministry between Lehigh Valley Presbytery and Philadelphia Presbytery will move forward, retaining Kirkwood as the site. All the amendments from General Assembly were passed by our Presbytery.

Shared Ministry Council Notes...

The Shared Ministry Council received notice that John Kampmeyer has offered his resignation as organist and choir director for our churches, effective as of December 31st. This letter will be taken to each Session for action during the next meetings in January. The SMC met to set up the next steps to be taken as we search for God's direction in our music ministry. The job description was reviewed and updated. Musicians to lead music during the transition period through the first week of February have been put in place. The Worship Committees of each church will be asked to have input into the process of determining the skills desired in a future music director. Using this information will help to further develop the job description for advertising the position and meeting with candidates. The SMC welcomes your input and asks for your continued prayers as we seek to move into a new era of music leadership. We give thanks for a wonderful 5 1/2 years of praise filled worship times with John.


Souperbowl of Caring

A Letter from Sharon Knoell

Greetings! Grace and peace to you from the cold and windy Endless Mountains! This has been a whirlwind of a year for me, and I could not have done it without the love, prayer, and support of both Princeton and Chambers.

As most of you know, I graduated from Princeton in May, and I packed up and moved to Waverly, NY at the end of July. Since August 1, I've been serving as the very first solo pastor of Valley United Presbyterian Church on the PA / NY border. I was ordained and installed by the Presbytery of the Susquehanna Valley (in New York) on October 12th. Pam even traveled all the way up here to preach at my service!

Valley United is truly a unique church. I was attracted to this call for many reasons, but primarily because I believe that what Valley United has done is going to be the model for the future of small church ministry.

The Penn-York Valley or "The Valley," as this area is called, is located in the Twin Tiers. There are three communities here in the Valley - Athens, PA, Sayre, PA, and Waverly, NY - and all three are connected within a few miles of each other. Before 2013, each of the three communities had their own Presbyterian church, and about a year ago, they decided to merge. None of the three could afford to continue functioning financially, membership numbers had dwindled, and it made sense for the congregations to combine.

One year ago, they merged under the name Valley United, and in June they sold the Sayre church to another denomination. So, though the three churches have been in existence since the 1800s, I am the very first pastor of the newly-combined Valley United. And we now have two church buildings straddling the state border - one in Athens (PA) and one in Waverly (NY) - and we alternate worship every month between the two.

Personally, I've found it very challenging to be both a new pastor and the pastor of a newly-merged church all at the same time. Each of the three congregations did things very differently, and it's been hard for them to reorganize and adjust to a new way of doing things. It's been interesting to figure out how we can unite as one congregation when the congregation doesn't even really know each other!

One of the blessings in this situation is that we're all figuring it out together. It's been fun to introduce new hymns, start new traditions, and resurrect our informal worship service that had been very popular in Waverly a few years ago. Between the two services, we're averaging about 100 attendees on a Sunday morning, and some members who had fallen away from the church during the merger have come back and are worshiping with us regularly.

Please continue to pray for me and for Valley United. We've got a long road ahead as we figure out who God is calling us to be, and we're going to need extra love and support as we begin figuring out what to do with two church buildings.
