Transition Thoughts

Greetings my brothers and sisters in Christ. This Easter season I am choosing to echo my thoughts from a year ago. We are an Easter People. Our lives as Christians are formed by our experience of Christ's resurrection. As you read this, we will be moving from the parades of Palm Sunday, into the dark shadows of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, all in preparation for the joyful "Alleluias" of Easter morn. Christ Is Risen!

In word and music, in prayer and in song we will be lifted into God's presence as we celebrate Christ's resurrection. We know that in God's raising Jesus from the dead, the hold of sin and death, of evil is broken, and that God has ushered in the kingdom that is ruled by love and peace. We are an Easter people, living in this loving reign of God.

And yet, there is still so much out there that would argue against this triumph. Suffering, and death, injustice, hatred, are still present. And they are very real. As an Easter people we live in the midst of this tension, knowing that God has already conquered, and is yet conquering the evil of this world. The resurrection means that "Christ rules in the hearts and lives of the individual believers, as well as in the gathered believers, in the church. The world at large may still be gripped by the powers of darkness, but their power is broken in believers who place their trust in Christ and acknowledge his lordship in their lives. They experience the present reality of the freedom, love, joy, reconciliation, and new life of the kingdom of God."

Shirley Guthrie, a teacher of systematic theology gave us some guidance for living "Between the Times" of God's triumph in the resurrection of Christ, and the fullness of God's reign over all that is. In his book <u>Christian Doctrine</u>, he counseled that:

- 1. We must take evil seriously. We "cannot ignore that godless injustice, suffering, and inhumanity do and will continue to ravage our individual lives and our world." "...Evil is so powerful that no human beings in history but only Christ in the end of history will finally overcome it. Until then Christ himself is often not present in the world as triumphant Lord who overcomes all the oppressive, death-bringing powers of evil...Rather, he is often present as despised, rejected, crucified Lord who suffers with and for all who are the victims of these powers.
- 2. We must not take evil more seriously than we do God. This is a world in which there is evil. But Jesus Christ is risen. Evil may be stronger than you or me, but it is not stronger than God. It is God who has the last word, and no darkness will overcome the light that has come into this world. No matter how bad things may look, Easter people know that there is a power at work now to overcome all that is wrong with this world, a power that keeps breaking into our lives, changing us, making things new, and which gives us glimpses of God's final triumph.
- 3. We can and must fight against evil. "The confession that Jesus is Lord does not mean that we can sit back with a sigh of relief and tell ourselves that everything is all right now. The powers of evil around us and within us have not yet admitted defeat. The risen Lord is still finishing the work he began, and to call Jesus Lord means to throw ourselves into the battle with him."

Friends, Christ is risen. We are an Easter people.

In recent years, there has been increased debate about whether religious beliefs are in direct conflict to science, and the greatest debate concerns evolution. Special Meeting of the Congregation

The Session of the Ewing Presbyterian Church, at its regular stated meeting on March 24th, voted to call a special meeting of the congregation immediately following the 9:30 worship service on April 19th, 2015. The special meeting of the congregation is called for the purpose of electing members of the congregation to serve as Elders and Deacons of the church, filling existing vacancies in the Session and Board of Deacons.

March Session Update

At its March 24th meeting, the Session:

Heard the report of the Commissioners to the March meeting of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, including the actions of the Presbytery affirming the addition of the Confession of Belhar to the *Book of Confessions* of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and voting to amend the the Book of Worship in the *Book of Order* so that it now reads, "Marriage involves a unique commitment between two people, traditionally a man and a woman..." It also allows a minister to perform a marriage service and gives each session the authority to allow church property to be used for such a service, but shall not "compel a teaching elder (minister) to perform nor compel a session to authorize the use of church property for a marriage service."

Heard the report of Rev. Katie Mulligan on her work as the youth minster for this congregation, Covenant, and Lawrence Road Churches, including her work with the Sr. High LOG (Love of God) program, ongoing work with middle-school age youth from the three churches and Trenton, and her outreach to the individual youth of this congregation. She reported on planning that is underway for an intergenerational mission trip to West Virginia this summer, and for a Monday evening meal and worship service to be developed for youth and their families in the area served by the three churches.

Acted to reorganize the Session's working groups into two teams; Operations, and Faith Development.

The Faith Development Team will work with the programs and ministry previously overseen by the Adult Education, Mission and Service, the Children and Youth, Membership and Communications, Stewardship, and Worship Committees. The Deacons ministries will also part of this Team's focus.

The Operations Team will focus on the work previously encompassed by the Finance, Buildings and Grounds, and Cemetery Committees. The Personnel Committee will work with both Teams.

With this reorganization, Don Lovett was elected to serve as the President of the Corporation, with Wayne Berens to serve as Vice-President. Ginny Saiia was previously elected to serve as the Clerk of the Session, and thus the Secretary of the Corporation, and Barbara Salles was elected to serve as Treasurer.

Voted to approve and support the Proclamation of May 1st as a Day of Unity in the Community (See *Unity in the Community) for this congregation in solidarity with the City of Trenton and the communities of Mercer County; to promote participation by members of this congregation in the events to be held on May 1st and during the week that follows leading to the National Day of Prayer; and to encourage the Ewing Township to consider and support the Proclamation of May 1st as a Day of Unity in the Community within Ewing Township and in solidarity with the City of Trenton and the communities of Mercer County.

*Unity in the Community, May 1st

Almost a year ago, on the National Day of Prayer, a number of people from the greater Trenton area gathered for a Prayer Walk that traveled to the sites of where people of the Trenton community were murdered between January 1st and May 1st, 2014.

Sponsored by the United Mercer Interfaith Organization (UMIO), the Prayer walk was dubbed the "Murder Walk" as it visited the places where people of the community had met tragic and violent death. At each site, prayers were offered for the victims, for their families and friends, and for those who committed the murders. It was an incredibly moving and powerful event for all those who participated. From that first prayer walk, a monthly prayer vigil formed that continues to be held on the first Monday of each month at Covenant Presbyterian Church. People continue to gather to offer prayers for those who have died, those who have left behind by these murders, those who carried them out, and for an end to the violence that strikes the greater Trenton community.

UMIO, and those who have continued to gather for this prayer vigil are at work to hold a second Prayer Walk for those who have died violently in the first part of this year. The second Prayer Walk will be held on Friday, May 1st, going to the places where five (to date) people have been slain through the first months of 2015. We will again offer prayers for those who have died, for the family and friends who have been left behind by their murders, for those who committed this violence, and for an end to violence in the greater Trenton community.

This year's Prayer Walk will be part of an even greater effort supported by UMIO and the communities of Trenton and the rest of Mercer County. The Trenton City Council, the Board of Freeholders of Mercer County, the municipal governments of Mercer County will all be considering a Proclamation for May 1st to be a Day of Unity in the Community, when the municipalities will join in solidarity with the City of Trenton, with a diversity of local faith inspired communities and community based organizations will join together in unified prayer, community action and interfaith fellowship to raise a unified voice in the promotion of peace throughout the Trenton and Mercer County.

The May 1st Unity in the Community will begin a week-long series of events to focus the broader communities attention on ending the violence that threatens our interconnected communities. Among those events will be:

A Portrait of Hunger

A recent survey by Feeding America addressed the growing need for food and the impact of that need on food pantries and meal sites, and ultimately on area food banks such as Mercer Street Friends Food Bank.

91% of food pantries and meal sites say they feed as many or more people as they did in the prior year and 61% saw an increase in demand for food. This strain on charitable assistance programs increases the need for additional supplies from area food banks.

Food banks account for 63% of the food that stocks pantries and meal sites. Fresh fruit and vegetables (62%) and protein food items like meat (52%) were listed as the most wanted products. 84% of pantries and meal sites reported that it would have a major effect on their program if they no longer received food from their food banks. Food banks serve as an integral lifeline in providing much-needed food supplies.

Ewing Presbyterian Church continues its longstanding relationship with Mercer Street Friends Food Bank with the generous donations of food items that are collected on the third Sunday of the each month. Please remember Mercer Street Friends when you are grocery shopping. Every item donated truly makes a difference.

Every Sunday is a Little Easter

Beginning with the first Easter, the celebration of the Resurrection has been the focus of Christian worship. Because the early disciples were Jews they would have observed the Sabbath on Saturday. However, the first day of the week became the day for Christian worship. It was known as the Lord's Day, the day of Resurrection. Our weekly Sunday worship is a celebration of Jesus' resurrected presence with us — a little Easter each week

The season of Lent is 40 days long, not counting Sunday. The actual number of days from Lent's start to Easter Sunday is 46 days. But because the church sees every Sunday as a mini-Easter celebrating Christ's resurrection, the six Sundays that occur during Lent are not counted.


